STUDENT FEEDBACK SURVEY

At Nandha Arts and Science College, student feedback is regarded as a critical tool to enhance the quality of education and overall campus experience. In line with this commitment, a comprehensive *Student Feedback Survey* was conducted on **31st May 2023**. The objective of this initiative was to gather valuable insights from students regarding teaching quality, infrastructure, administrative support, and other facilities provided by the college.

This feedback exercise included questions covering two broad categories:

- 1. Teaching and Learning Effectiveness
- 2. College Infrastructure, Administrative Support, and Student Facilities

The survey was carefully designed to evaluate various aspects of the college experience, ensuring that the concerns and suggestions of students are taken into account for the continuous improvement of the institution.

PURPOSE OF THE FEEDBACK SURVEY

The main goals of the student feedback survey were:

- To assess the **effectiveness** and **quality** of teaching in classrooms.
- To evaluate the **infrastructure** and **facilities** available to students on campus.
- To identify areas that require improvement and explore opportunities for enhancing the learning environment.
- To encourage an open dialogue between students and management for the betterment of the institution.

SURVEY STRUCTURE

The survey consisted of questions grouped into two major categories:

1. Teaching and Learning Experience:

- Coverage of syllabus.
- Punctuality and preparation of teachers.

- Communication skills and teaching methods of faculty.
- Encouragement of interaction, extracurricular activities, and life skills.
- Use of modern tools (ICT tools like projectors, multimedia, etc.).
- Internal evaluation fairness.


2. College Infrastructure and Student Support:

- Library and computer laboratory infrastructure.
- Sports amenities and office staff support.
- Complaint redressal mechanisms.
- Facilities such as canteen, Wi-Fi, drinking water, and washroom maintenance.
- Cleanliness and overall infrastructure of classrooms and college premises.

Teaching and Learning Effectiveness

1. How much of the syllabus Covered



The data reveals that a significant majority of respondents, 1,325, reported syllabus coverage of 85% to 100%, indicating that most participants have made excellent progress. Another 575 respondents fall into the 70% to 84% range, reflecting strong but slightly less complete coverage. 78 responses reported syllabus coverage of 55% to 69%, suggesting moderate progress. A smaller portion, 64 responses, indicated 30% to 54% coverage, while only 53 responses reported coverage below 30%, indicating minimal progress. Overall, the majority of respondents have completed a substantial portion of the syllabus, with only a small fraction lagging behind.

2. How well did the teachers prepare for the class.



The majority of respondents, 1,125, felt that teachers were **Thoroughly** prepared for class, reflecting a high level of dedication and effectiveness. 363 responses rated the preparation as **Satisfactory**, indicating that while adequate, there is room for improvement. 161 responses described the preparation as **Indifferent**, suggesting a lack of consistency or engagement in some cases. A smaller group, 44 responses, rated the preparation as **Poorly**, pointing to dissatisfaction among a few respondents. Overall, the data indicates that teachers are generally well-prepared, though there are areas for enhancement.

3. How well were the teachers able to communicate

The majority of respondents, 1,125, rated the teachers' communication as Always Effective, indicating that most teachers were highly effective in conveying information. 863 responses found communication to be Sometimes Effective, suggesting occasional challenges or inconsistencies. 61 responses rated communication as Just Satisfactory, reflecting a need for improvement in a few cases. Only 44 responses indicated Poor Communication, showing minimal dissatisfaction. Overall, the data highlights strong communication skills among teachers, with some areas for improvement.

4. The teachers approach to teaching can be described as



The majority of respondents, 1,120, rated the teachers' approach as Excellent, indicating exceptional teaching methods and a strong positive perception. 313 responses described the approach as Very Good, and 505 responses rated it as Good, suggesting a generally favorable view of teaching practices. A small group, 25 responses, rated the approach as Fair, and only 20 responses considered it Poor, reflecting minimal dissatisfaction. Overall, the data indicates that most respondents are highly satisfied with the teachers' approach to teaching.

5. Fairness of the internal evaluation process



The majority of respondents, **1,600**, believe the internal evaluation process is **Always Fair**, demonstrating a high level of trust and satisfaction. **338 responses** rated it as **Usually Fair**, indicating that while fair overall, there might be occasional inconsistencies. A smaller group, **95 responses**, felt the process was **Sometimes Unfair**, reflecting some concerns about fairness. Only **10 responses** described it as **Usually Unfair**, suggesting minimal dissatisfaction. Overall, the data reflects a strong perception of fairness in the internal evaluation process, with only a few expressing doubts.

6. Teachers encourage you to participate in extracurricular activities




A majority of respondents, 1,325, Agree that teachers encourage participation, and an additional 575 Strongly Agree, indicating strong support for extracurricular activities. 78 responses were Neutral, suggesting a lack of strong encouragement or involvement in some cases. A smaller group, 64 responses, Disagree, and 53 responses Strongly Disagree, reflecting minimal dissatisfaction with the level of encouragement. Overall, the data indicates that most teachers actively promote extracurricular activities, with only a few respondents perceiving a lack of encouragement.

7. What percentage of teachers use ICT tools such as LCD projector,

Multimedia etc.,?



The majority of respondents, 1,600, reported that Above 90% of teachers use ICT tools such as LCD projectors and multimedia, indicating a high level of technological integration in teaching. 338 responses rated ICT usage at 70 to 89%, reflecting strong but slightly less frequent usage. A smaller group, 95 responses, indicated usage between 50 to 69%, and only 10 responses reported usage Below 50%, showing minimal gaps in ICT adoption. Overall, the data highlights widespread use of ICT tools by teachers, with few areas needing improvement.

8. Efforts made by the institute / teachers to inculcate soft skills, life skills and employability skills to make you ready for the world of work.


The majority of respondents, **1,600**, reported that efforts are made **to a great extent**, indicating strong initiatives by the institute and teachers to prepare students for the workforce. **338 responses** rated the efforts as **Moderate**, suggesting consistent but less comprehensive support. **75 responses** indicated the efforts were made **Somewhat**, while only **30 responses** felt the efforts were **Very Little**, reflecting minimal dissatisfaction. Overall, the data demonstrates significant efforts by the institute and teachers to enhance students' readiness for the world of work, with only minor areas for improvement.
